THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 23 JEFF&GORDON: Not at the Dinner Table

(Telephone). A phone-based art project from artist duo JEFF&GORDON returns for another timely, participatory experience inviting the public to call and leave anonymous voicemails for those with whom they disagree-and hear messages left since the project was first presented in 2013. Not at the Dinner Table is offered every year during the holidays, when people are most likely to encounter their least favorite family members. But by distancing this dynamic from the context of the relationship, the artists hope they can help foster more understanding, or maybe offer space for a rehearsal to those planning on entering the fray in person. Each edition's phone number is selected for an area code that highlights a particularly hot-button issue. This year, it's Santa Rosa, CA, home to Maia Kobabe, author of the book Gender Queer: a Memoir,

10 FREEWAY OPENS AHEAD OF SCHEDULE AFTER FIRE

After A Massive Blaze Compromised The Integrity Of The 10 Freeway In Los Angeles, It Has Been Fully Reopened, Months Ahead Of Schedule.

he 10 Freeway area near downtown Los Angeles reopened weeks ahead of schedule after a suspected arson fire.

An initial estimate given by California Gov. Gavin Newsom on Nov. 14 saw a three to five-week timeframe for repairs, which was later changed to Tuesday, Nov. 21 and ultimately Monday, Nov. 20.

"What began as months has turned into days — before Angelenos hit the road on Monday, we're opening the 10 back up," Gov. Newsom said in a statement. "Thanks to the tireless work of Caltrans and union construction crews and with help from our partners — from the Mayor's office to the White House — the 10's expedited repair is proof and a point of pride that here in California, we deliver."

Now all lanes going both ways have been opened and deemed safe to drive on by Los Angeles and California officials, only eight days after the blaze broke on the weekend of Nov. 11.

The construction has not stopped,

however, as a full repair is still expected to take months, despite the lanes opening. For that reason, Caltrans has warned drivers to expect occasional night and weekend road closures.

The governor declared a state of emergency for the freeway, opening up federal funds from the Federal Highway Administration's Emergency Relief Program, allowing Caltrans to have personnel available 24 hours a day to work on the repairs.

The fire occurred Saturday, Nov. 11 at approximately 12:30 a.m., and continued through the night with investigators suspecting an arson case. The fire burned through a storage yard on both sides of 14th Street, altering the integrity of the freeway's supporting beams.

Photos of the suspect were released to the public on Sunday, Nov. 19, using surveillance footage from the area.

Investigators said the suspect is believed to be a man between 30 to 35 years old, approximately 6 feet tall and had visible burns to his leg, as well as a knee brace. He was wearing a black hoodie with blue shorts at the time the video was taken, and had black hair, although his race and eye color could not be determined.

Initially, city officials announced a 24-hour closure, but after reviewing the damage to the freeway, more extensive repairs and further closure dates were needed.

Onlookers recorded video of the fire, showing the flames completely engulfing the stretch of freeway, with the fire believed to have started underneath.

A day after the fire, LAFD showed photos of the damage underneath the freeway, with debris and ash filling the underpass.

In the days leading up to the opening, Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass urged Angelenos to opt to take Metro for their commutes through the city. During that time L.A. DOT offered free rides through their Commuter Express, an offer that was extended until the end of 2023.

The owners of the property under the freeway are Apex Development Inc., which the governor's office said they are in an active lawsuit with. The company is being accused of not paying its rent and subletting the property without authorization.

"We've been in a litigious posture for some time," Gov. Newsom said in a statement Monday. "They stopped paying their rent, they're out of compliance... and they have been subleasing this site to at least five, maybe as many as six tenants, without authorization from Caltrans or from our federal partners."

Globe Theatre To Stay Open After Fears of Permanent Closure

After fears that the Globe Theatre in downtown L.A. would close permanently, L.A. Weekly can confirm that it will remain open.

The theater said it would "for sure" stay in operation and most of its upcoming events will continue as originally planned.

On Tuesday, Nov. 14, multiple events appeared to be on the lookout for new locations with the GPS, or Gay Pride Saturday, briefly having moved its weekend event to Heart WeHo. GPS announced it would remain at the Globe with its latest Instagram post reading, "The Globe is here to stay."

The Nov. 17 Electroton Rave which was previously scheduled to be held at the Globe, moved to Catch One on Pico Boulevard, as they had already made arrangements soon after the closure scare.

Prestige Wrestling, who had announced its plans to find a new location for its Dec. 14 Combat Princess event, said it would remain at the Globe.

"After searching for a new venue and confirming a new location for our joint

show with TJPW, we were told tonight by the venue management the Globe Theater will now remain open," Prestige Wrestling posted in an online message. "... we have been told contracts are in place that will allow the Globe Theater to remain open for years to come."

The Globe's website, which was previously not operating, is back up and running.

The Globe Theatre, originally known as the Morosco Theater, first opened its doors in 1913 for vaudeville acts and eventually film screenings. It was attached to the Garland Building and built by the architecture firm Morgan, Walls and Morgan, known for its unique Beaux Art design.

After years without use, the theater was reopened after a remodel in 2015.

The Globe Theatre has a designation in the National Historic District according to the Los Angeles Conservancy.

Man Charged With Manslaughter In Death of Sheriff's Recruit

The Los Angeles District Attorney's Office announced felony manslaughter charges against a man believed to be responsible for a wrong-way crash that killed an L.A. County Sheriff's Department recruit in Whittier.

Sheriff Robert Luna said the charges were a "significant step toward bringing justice" to the family and friends of recruit Alejandro Martinez-Inzunza. Los Angeles County Sheriff Robert Luna added that its department was committed to "holding accountable," the suspect in the incident.

"The felony filings today are a step towards justice for the family of Deputy Alejandro Martinez and all the LASD Recruits who were injured, many of whom have life-altering injuries sustained because of this tragic incident," Luna said. "The collaborative efforts among the California Highway Patrol Multi-disciplinary Accident Investigation Team and our Homicide Bureau detectives illustrates our commitment and diligence in holding the individual accountable for this horrific incident."

The crash occurred on Nov. 17, 2022, as a group of recruits were on their standard 6 a.m. run through the city. Surveillance footage from the area showed the car speed toward the running recruits, hitting the group and injuring 25, on top of the death.

At the time, after conducting multiple interviews on-scene, former Sheriff Alex Villanueva said there was reason to believe that it was a deliberate act.

Suspect Nicholas Gutierrez faces two counts of vehicular manslaughter with gross negligence and nine counts of reckless driving on a highway causing a specified injury.

BYRDSEED IS THE NEWEST SEED COMPANY IN TOWN

Legacy L.A. Genetics Are About To Hit The Streets. BY JIMI DEVINE



Bern rett Feldman is one of the few survivors in the Los Angeles cannabis market, and now he's giving the genetics that helped fuel Wonderbrett to the world. We ran into Feldman by chance last weekend at Storz and Bickel's launch party for the Venty. In front of Feldman sat a collection of his newest heaters and a few classics. The first thing that caught my eye was the BrydSeed sticker on the side of the black jars.

Feldman dove in on the new company where he is currently a one-man



show with support from his wife shucking seeds into the wee hours of the morning after he's already spent 10 hours of the day working on Wonderbrett stuff.

"All right, so, I've been wanting to put out a seed line for like, several years now. But with the way Wonderbrett set up," Feldman said, "I wasn't gonna get what I felt was fair out of it."

Essentially when Feldman expanded Wonderbrett, the tracks were laid in a certain way that made it difficult to do the seeds. The Wonderbrett seedline isn't off the table either. It's just Feldman has been doing a lot of personal work on these lines over the years that doesn't have anything to do with that.

"But like all the dopest crazy shit I've been making for like the past like five years, I got a deep well that I can't get to fast enough," Feldman said. "I need more space to pheno hunt. It's just frustrating. So I just wanted to make the seed line and put out the seeds and just share like all these things I've created over the past few years with the world really, and let other people run with it."

Feldman hopes his efforts will find their way into crosses with all the most exciting gear of the moment once they're out there. He noted all the crazy genetics that helped put him on the map, the Pink Picasso cut, the OZ Kush he hunted from the original Dying Breed drop, none of those have ever been given out.

Feldman emphasized how tight they kept everything. Now he is excited to be able to share everything, "and just give out like a whole like lane of things that we had to ourselves for a long time." Feldman went on to speak to how the selections for the line are being made. He isn't really holding anything back, it's just more of a timing thing, as Wonderbrett will of course continue to drop his newest heaters, too.

"Wherever it fits, it goes," Feldman explained. "It's not like I'm holding it back for something else, right? If it's time for Wonderbrett to drop a new strain it is going into that like the cush cola did."

We asked Feldman if he ever gets a kick out of the Jekyll and Hyde aspect of it all. When you see him or hear his name, you think of one of the survivors that's lucky enough to still own a piece of his efforts, efforts that took off obviously. But ByrdSeed is a homebased startup and one-man operation. He laughed, noting it all just goes back to Prop 215 days.

Wonderbrett started with the ethos that they wanted to grow fire, consistently, without bullshitting people after seeing so many OG renamed in pill bottles during the early years of legal medical cannabis access in California. That ethos carries on to ByrdSeed.

We asked Feldman when he expects to hit the circuit growers have to be on to really be considered "doing it" and not just some random Two-Light Terry tossing pollen all over his mom's basement.

"I'll probably do like a few events this year. Like that's my plan this year. I'm not really a big traveler," Feldman said before speaking on Spannabis in Barcelona next March, "but I really need to because everybody's asked me to come out there."

Expect nine strains in the first Byrd-Seed drop.

Visual Storytelling for a Season of Reflection




he end of the year is not just for holidays and gifting—it's also a season of reflection, recollection, and resolution. With that in mind, here are our picks among eclectic books on art, photography, filmmaking, architecture, urban design, absurdist pedagogy, extreme BTS, obsessive penpals, fantasy illustration, and the inner and activist lives of artists—all perfect for smartening up your own bookshelves or those of someone you love.

Sofia Coppola: *Archive* (MACK). Though not technically a memoir, the substantial book exploring Coppola's filmography in extensive, intimate contemporaneous documentation, ephemera, work process materials, script notes, etc. effectively functions as one. The rich visual narrative and associated conversations touch on aspects of the auteur's creative process across all of her films, from *The Virgin Suicides* (1999) to *Lost in Translation* (2003) and her forthcom-

But despite its purported outward focus on Coppola's cinematic art, one leaves the book with an impression of knowing her better as a person—including how thoroughly immersed in her artistic pursuits she is, and what it's like to be in on it. *mackbooks.us*.

Toilet Paper, Issue 20 (Damiani). Artists, provocateurs, friends, collaborators—Maurizio Cattelan and Pierpaolo





Ferrari have been publishing their slinky, outrageous experimental design magazine since June 2010—but *Toilet Paper* is more than a magazine, it's a parallel universe for the palm of your hand. Channeling the visual conventions and tonal armature of commercial/ fashion/celebrity/advertising photography but infusing that lexicon with upsetting surrealism and an assertive lack of contextualizing copy, *Toilet Paper* is a drastic intervention in our somnambulistic media consumption, and a work of art in its own right. <u>artbook.com.</u>




Kent Monkman: The Memoirs of Miss Chief Eagle Testikle, Volumes One & Two (Penguin/Random House). Artist Kent Monkman's prolific alter ego Miss Chief Eagle Testickle has appeared in his epic paintings over the years, participating in the wild, queer, exuberant, blended historical tableaux for which the artist is known. But in a new two-volume book, Monkman and his long-time collaborator Gisèle Gordon are fully dedicated to telling Miss Chief Eagle Testikle's very own story. As the character's talents for time travel and shape-shifting put them in the perfect position to survey the sweep of history, they turn their attention to the queer Indigenous nexus, the shameful history of what is now called America, and the

still-unfolding damage of that legacy in the present day. Fortunately for all humanity, it might just be within their power to show us a better way before it's too late. *penguinrandomhouse.ca*.



Shana Novak: The Heirloomist (Chronicle Books). From Instagram to above the mantlepiece, as @theheirloomist, photographer Shana Novak has made an art (and a business) out of making memories. Well, more like preserving them. Actually, what she does is both preservation and transformation, as she has developed a technique creating "hero" style large format photographs out of keepsakes, mementos, heirlooms, and seemingly ordinary objects imbued with personal meaning—the kind we all have, probably in boxes and drawers, thinking only of their sentimental value but not always of their beauty. In her first book, Novak selects pieceskeychains, toys, matchbooks, baby shoes, pens, silver, cards, receipts, and all manner of meaningful meaningless things-and presents them along with their stories. Hearing from friends, clients, and celebrities alike, this charming



The Fantastic Worlds of Frank Frazetta (TASCHEN). The Godfather of fantasy art finally gets a proper monograph, as a team of artists, writers, scholars, and family members pay weighty tribute to Frazetta's insane vision and industry-changing career. As the book both explains and illustrates, Frazetta's definitional glow ups of Tarzan and Conan began in the late 1960s and basically built the worlds we know for those characters—especially Conan, whose juiced up muscles and machismo were largely based on the guys he knew from his classic Brooklyn upbringing. His work blurred boundaries between comics, sci-fi, fantasy, pulp, animation and eventually cinema (we basically have him to thank for Arnold Schwarzenegger's

career), but as this book tenderly and amply shows, he was first and foremost a true artist. *taschen.com*.

Dawoud Bey: *Elegy* (Aperture/Virginia Museum of Fine Arts). Dawoud Bey is best known for his iconic street photography, especially around Harlem, as well as his powerful portraiture, dedicated to an honorable representation of Afri-

can American life in the United States. However with *Elegy*—a monograph produced in conjunction with a major exhibition—Bey brings together three portfolios of landscape photography. Night Coming Tenderly, Black (2017), In This Here Place (2021), and Stoney the Road (2023) are situated firmly within his overall practice, but with a switch of perspective from the cities and faces of Black America to the very country itself, the landscapes and landmarks steeped in the bloody, contested history of Virginia, Louisiana, and Ohio. Following the trail of enslavement from auction blocks to plantations to escape and emancipation, Bey reveals that the past is not only a painful prologue, but very much alive in the present. aperture.org.

The New Brownies' Book: A Love Letter to Black Families (Chronicle Books). Inspired by the work of scholar and activist W. E. B. Du Bois—who in 1920 joined the founders of the NAACP to publish The Brownies' Book: A Monthly Magazine for Children of the Sun—a




modern survey of Black creatives takes up the mantle for uplift and inspiration. From the gorgeous cover image by Atlanta-based photographer Tokie Rome-Taylor, who channels conventions of upper class portraiture to illuminate the regal qualities within communities




of color, to an eclectic array of visual styles, essays, poems, photographs, paintings, and short stories reflecting on Black joy, *The New Brownies' Book* is on a mission to instill a new generation with pride, love, curiosity, and ambition. *chroniclebooks.com.*

Groundswell: Women of Land Art (Delmonico Books/Nasher Sculpture Center). When most folks hear "land art," they think of Robert Smithson's Spiral Jetty, and maybe Walter De Maria's Lightning Field. James Turrell's Roden Crater. The point is, when they think of an artist out there with bulldozers and earth-movers, dragging giant boulders around and literally changing geography, they are probably also thinking of the men. But just like everything else, it turns out there were always women at the table, doing their own very good work, despite being overshadowed and underfunded. It turns out, the same has been true of Land art. But a new show and catalog for Groundswell: Women of Land Art shifts that attention and (re)








Green Day

Dookie: 30th Anniversary Super Deluxe Edition (Reprise) Dookie is probably the album that defines '90s pop-punk above all others. To be fair, it is a bit of a masterpiece. For its 30th birthday, this box is wonderful. Six LPs include the original album plus demos, outtakes and two full concerts. There's also a glossy book, a poster, a print, a paper airplane (yes really), fridge magnets, a sticker, a pin set, a car air fresh, a postcard, and a roll of doggie poo bags (for picking up dookie, we guess). It all comes in a silver box, and the music is awesome. All box sets should be this much fun.

Devo

50 Years of De-Evolution 1973-2003 (Rhino/Warner)

While Devo is embarking on its farewell tour, it's fitting that we celebrate the incredible career in every possible way and this career-spanning box really does highlight what an artistically brilliant, dazzling and, frankly, fun band Devo has been. We'll never see anyone like them again. Two double albums take us from the start to the finish, musically. We also get a paper Devo hat, stickers and a book. But the headline is, we're going to miss Devo.

Pantera

1990-2000: The Complete Studio Albums (Rhino/Atco)

"Complete" is a bit of a stretch, seeing as Pantera released four albums prior to its 1990's Cowboys From Hell, but the band has done all it can to erase those early, glammy records from existence. It's fair to say that the super-intense metal Pantera began with Cowboys, and that's where this awesome box set begins. All five albums are picture discs, and the set looks beautiful. Cowboys and Vulgar Display of Power sound as good as ever. and Far Beyond Driven holds up well. The last two are the biggest surprises – they've both dated remarkably well and sound brutal. A great box, to coincide with the recent reunion while also paying tribute to fallen heroes Dimebag Darrell and Vinnie Paul.

Motley Crue

Shout at the Devil: 40th Anniversary Limited Edition Box Set (BMG)

With the dust settled and with all said and done, Shout at the Devil is probably the Crue's best album. It's raw, a bit nasty, their makeup hadn't quite gone "pretty boy" yet, and the songs are immense. So it deserves a birthday party, and this box is about perfect. The album is in there on three formats (LP, CD, cassette tape), and there's a second LP of rarities and demos. The goodies don't stop there – there are two 7-inch singles, plus a metal pentagram 7-inch adaptor. There's a bandana and a Ouija board (with metal pointer), and weirdly but gloriously, a devil candle holder. Tarot cards too. They really milked the devil theme, but it's tons of fun.

lce T

The Legend of Ice T: Crime Stories (MVD Entertainment / Ruffnation Entertainment)

In the sleeve notes for this gorgeous vinyl package, Ice T himself explains that he just hasn't felt inspired to write a new album for years, and he can't force it. So we'll have to make do with this careerspanning compilation spread across three LPs on clear vinyl with red splatter. That really plays up the "crime stories" theme.

Chris Schwartz, owner of Ruffnation Entertainment, stated, "When you look at the volume of artists brought to us via hip-hop culture, there have been less than a handful who have true multigenerational appeal. Ice-T is hip-hop's first breakthrough actor, spokesperson, and chronicler." Can't argue with that.

Salt-N-Pepa

Very Necessary: 30th Anniversary Edition (Republic Records) Glass ceiling smashers Salt-N-Pepa's Very Necessary gets a deserved 30-year celebration with a lovely 2 LP set, on blue vinyl and with some extra tunes. Somehow, Salt-N-Pepa remain underrated — whenever they play on a hip-hop bill, they're way too low down on the poster. But as we celebrate 50 years of the genre, it's great to hear songs like "What Man," "None of Your Business" and "Shop" again.

Motorhead

Another Perfect Day: 40th Anniversary Celebration (BMG) Unlike Crue's Shout at the Devil, nobody would seriously say that Another Perfect Day (released the same year) is Motorhead's best album. It is a fascinating one though. It's the only Motorhead studio album to feature former Thin Lizzv man Brian "Robbo" Robertson. Some say Robbo wasn't really suited to Motorhead, but it really is an interesting period in the band's history. As well as the album, this set includes a live show from that period, for a total of three LPs.

The Kinks

The Journey, Part 2 (BMG)

The Kinks compilation The Journey, Part 1 was released earlier in the year and it's great, but Part 2 is arguably more interesting because it has more deep cuts on it — b-sides and oddities, and each one is glorious. The vinyl release is a joy — two heavyweight LPs in a beautiful gatefold sleeve with new sleeve notes by the band. Having said that, there are a few extra songs on the CD version, so maybe get both.

The Doors

Golden Doors (Elektra)

These recent Elektra reissues are superb. starting with the Japanese Doors compilation, on red vinyl with original replica Japanese liner notes, and a four-track 45 (also red). There's nothing on here that even casual Doors fans haven't heard before, but the package is sweet.

Love

Del Capo (Elektra)

Also on red vinyl and coming with a bonus 7-inch single is this bona fide classic from Love. It's worth noting that Johnny Echols' current touring version of Love is playing the Whisky as part of that venues' 60th anniversary celebrations. This reissue is a perfect way to get warmed up. Love is, quite simply, one of L.A.'s finest.

Otis Redding

Love Man (Atco)

More red vinyl, and another 45. This time, it's Otis' absolute classic, Love Man. The whole album, and the title track in particular, is gloriously sexy, intense R&B of the highest quality. If you only know the song "Love Man" from the Dirty Dancing soundtrack, get hip quick.

Aretha Franklin

Soul '69 (Atlantic)

The last of the "red vinyl and a 45" series, Aretha's Soul '69 was, back in 1969, considered a fresh start for the queen of R&B. "Aretha moves into new pastures, where fair comparisons can be made between today's greatest female voice, and those that have gone before," says journalist Ritchie Yorke on the original liner notes. Well said.

Social Distortion

Mommy's Little Monster



(Craft Recordings)

Yet another album that is celebrating its 40th anniversary is Social D's debut. No elaborate box set here, just five colored vinyl variants, plus solid 180 gram black. The OC punk legends have put out many great albums, and the debut is right up there with the best of them. Gnarly and cynical, the title track remains a fan favorite. This release does it justice.

Meat Puppets

In a Car, Up On the Sun and Camp *Songs* (Meat Puppets Music) The Meat Puppet's SST catalog from 1981 to '89 has been reissued, starting with the debut In a Car EP (officially self-titled) on 45. That's the punkiest and, arguably, the best that the band ever sounded. But there's plenty to love on Up On the Sun, while Camp Songs is a new live album of

Baroque Hoedown and Sixteen *Tambourines* (Yep Roc)

material recorded 1991-95. Dig in!

Paisley Underground heroes The 3 O'Clock is another band with a 40th anniversary to celebrate (what is it with 40th anniversaries this year?), this time for the magnificent Sixteen Tambourines album. That PU tag was always a bit silly – these guys play garage rock, and they're damn good at it. "Jet Fighter" is a proper classic. If you're new to them, get hip.

Tom Waits

Swordfish Trombones, Rain Dogs,

Franks Wild Years, Bone Machine and

The Black Rider (Universal/Island) Would you believe it, another 40th anniversary release? This time for Waits' '83 classic Swordfish Trombones. Actually though, five of his '80s albums have been remastered and re-released. The boozy opera of Franks Wild Years is a highlight, but Waits is never terrible and it's a treat to delve back into this chapter of his career.

Jewel

Spirit (Craft)

Alaskan singer and songwriter Jewel's second album, Spirit, is one of her best and it's been given the 25th anniversary treatment here. The gatefold vinyl is gorgeous and the music is exemplary. "Hands" remains one of Jewel's best songs, but there's no filler here.

Creem Magazine

Box set

The five print issues of Creem that have been published since the relaunch have been packaged together in a smart hard box, embossed with the Boy Howdy logo. Ignore any navsayers - new Creem might be different to the old magazine, but it's still good stuff. This box makes for a great gift.

Dr. Dre's "The Chronic" prints

It was an odd day when we received a tubular package on our doorstep, and it turned out to be an official print shot

by Jeremy Dupree from Dre's Chronic Masters 30th anniversary collection. Specifically, it's a print for the "B*tches Ain't Shit" master, which is a nice collector's item, but certainly not for everyone. That said, there are plenty more prints in the collection, as Dre's work is celebrated.

Steven L. Jones

Murder Ballads Old & New (Feral House)

This is interesting. Artist, writer and musician Jones has delved into some of the most painfully themed music ever composed. "This book is about unhappy music," reads the press release.

"Songs of death and loss caused by sudden, often violent reversals of fortune." Jones really does take the reader on a deep dive into agony starting with old war hymns and digging into the lyrics of everyone from Robert Johnson to the Mekons, looking in on Springsteen, Dylan and so many more along the way. It's not a light read, but it is beautifully written and confirms what we already knew - music can be wonderfully therapeutic.

Beck, Bogert & Appice

Live in Japan 1973 / Live in London 1974 (Rhino/Atco)

The trio of Jeff Beck, Tim Bogert and Carmine Appice was relatively shortlived – they were active for about two years from 1972. So it's a treat to hear two of their shows from that period in full. Two double albums, plus a hardcover book, a replica tour book and a poster make for a nice set.

John Fogerty

The Blue Ridge Rangers and John Fogerty (BMG)

Two reissues from the former CCR man – we get his first two solo albums in heavy vinyl glory. Nothing new added -this is just two awesome albums sounding better than ever. The Blue Ridge Raiders was originally supposed to be a whole new band - it was only released with Fogerty's name on it later, hence the fact that his second album is self-titled. Sweet quirks aside, the music on both is magnificent.

Thunder

The Thrill of it All, Giving the Game Away and Shooting at the Sun (BMG)

Hard rockers Thunder were always much bigger in their native UK than over here, but there's still time to put that right. These three reissues have been lovingly put together on colored vinyl with a ton of bonus live tracks, and the albums sound great. Shooting at the Sun and opening track "Loser" are particularly perfect examples of what makes Thunder so special.
