
> ing with geometric patterns, delicate furniture forms, and vibrant text-to-





<u>HISTORIC RAINFALL</u> ITS LOS ANGELES TH DESTRUCTION

Southern California Was Hit By An Atmospheric River, Which Flooded Roads, Damaged Buildings, And Required Aid From The White House

os Angeles County has been hit with nearly nonstop rain for three days, and local and state leaders have deployed resources to counter the damage.

The passing atmospheric river has caused flooding, mudslides, damaged buildings, and eroded roadways in the city of L.A.

Throughout the weekend, Angelenos were startled by emergency alert notifications warning of life-threatening floods and were asked not to travel and be alert for evacuation orders.

Between Sunday, Feb. 4, and Monday, Feb. 5, Los Angeles saw its wettest twoday rainfall in February and third-strongest two-day rainfall, the most since January 1656. In less than a week into the month, it is already the 13th wettest

February in the city's history at nearly 9 inches of rainfall.

"Rainfall in downtown Los Angeles on the 4th and the 5th totaled 7.03

inches," The National Weather Service said. "That is the third wettest consecutive two-day total since official weather records began in 1877. The record for most rainfall for two days in a row in Downtown Los Angeles is 7.98 inches on December 31."

In Malibu, all schools were temporarily closed, both as a precaution and due to road closures. It was the only school district in Los Angeles affected.

Amid the storm, California Gov. Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency in multiple counties impacted by

"California is ready with a record

number of emergency assets on the ground to respond to this storm," the governor's office wrote in a statement. "This is a serious storm with dangerous

and potentially life-threatening impacts. Pay attention to any emergency orders or alerts from local officials."

On Monday, Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass signed a state of emergency declaration, which allows city funds and resources to be used where needed.

"Crews are working around the clock to address floods and areas at risk of being impacted by heavy rain," Bass said Monday. "This morning I signed a declaration of a local emergency, which will help our response and ensure that LA has the resources to respond to the storm now and as we recover."

While federal aid has not been activated as of this writing, U.S. President Joe Biden said the Southland would receive support "upon request."

"President Biden called... because he was concerned about what was happening in Los Angeles and he offered his support," Mayor Bass said during a press conference Tuesday. "He told me to call if there's anything we need and so I can assure Angelenos that call will be made today."

Bass also invited Gov. Newsom to Los Angeles to help assess the damage and resources that may be needed from the state. As of this writing, there have been more than 300 reported mudslides by the Los Angeles County Fire Department and more than 7,000 residents without power. Multiple mountainous communities were evacuated near La Tuna Canyon Road, as it is a high-risk flood and mudslide area.

"The city staff have worked diligently throughout the night to maintain city services and to address immediate needs and issues," Los Angeles Fire Department Chief Kristin Crowley said Tuesday. "Between six to 12 inches of rain have fallen across the region. This rain will continue to cause hazardous road conditions."

The city has activated 12 winter shelters, six more than usual, in collaboration with the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority. Those needing support and information relating to the shelters may call 2-1-1.

"The city will be working around the clock to serve," Mayor Bass said. "And we will keep you informed as the storm continues."

MOTION APPROVED TO INSTALL LICENSE PLATE READERS IN SAN FERNANDO

A motion to install license plate readers in the San Fernando Valley was approved by the Los Angeles City Council. Councilman John Lee introduced the

motion, which received an 11-1 vote to proceed for further deliberation. Councilmember Eunisses Hernandez held the only dissenting vote.

"I just can't stress enough how important this project is for our community," Lee said Tuesday. "Especially as certain portions of our district continue seeing a disproportionate increase in certain crimes, like residential burglaries."

Lee represents Council District 12, which includes the San Fernando neighborhoods of Northridge, Reseda, West Hills, North Hills, Porter Ranch, Chatsworth, and Granada Hills. The councilman said crime in his district increased more than 100% in certain communities.

Councilman Lee explained that the cameras would be used strictly for plate-reading purposes as needed by law enforcement. Lee added that they would not be used for traffic enforcement and would not result in traffic tickets.

"I'm pleased that today we are able to deliver on a critical project that will help with not only holding criminals accountable," Lee said. "But also deter those crimes from taking place in the first place."

During the Tuesday city council meeting, residents of District 12 voiced concerns over the plate readers, noting that fake license plates can be used to bypass the readers. One commenter expressed fear that the plate readers would violate privacy and will eventually lead to ways to track the public.

A total of \$250,000 would be allocated to the license plate reader program.

RETAIL THEFT TASK FORCE MAKES MORE THAN 400 ARRESTS

Since the inception of the Los Angeles Organized Retail Crimes Task Force, more than 400 retail theft arrests have been made.

From January 1, 2023, to December 31, 2023, roughly 200 cases were filed in relation to retail theft, according to Los Angeles County District Attorney George Gascón.

"Organized retail theft is not a victimless crime, it harms our community's sense of security while shopping at these retailers and the ability for local businesses to succeed," Gascón said. "When we saw a rise in organized retail theft crimes, I committed to holding these individuals accountable. Through my partnership with the Organized Retail Theft Task Force, we have been able to track down many of the offenders and bring them to justice."

The task force was created in August 2023, after Mayor Karen Bass noted an increase in specific retail thefts in the city.



MEET NATURAL MAGIC ARTIST CAMILLE ROSE GARCIA


rtist Camille Rose Garcia is enthralled and immersed in the magic of the majestic, transcendent, vast, intimate, and vulnerable natural world. Increasingly devoted to her life along California's forested northern coast, this child of extremely urban Los Angeles has developed a unique language of characters and symbols to express both a science-fiction inflected demimonde of spirits and witch queens, and an attentive, appreciative regard for the winged creatures of this planet and the rings and orbits of others. When a huge area of her beloved woodland was ravaged by a fire in 2023, Garcia turned to her art to express her sense of loss, dreams of a better world, and hope for healing—all of which though quite literal also makes a compelling metaphor for the human condition in these fraught and dangerous times.

Garcia's new exhibition at KP Projects gallery, The Polyphonic Fortress, opens this weekend and depicts glimpses into worlds of shells and driftwood, interstellar moonrises, bugs with kaleidoscopic wings, burnt offerings and shimmer-ing mists, fragile glaciers and heavy oceans, and above all the willful, defiant, glamorous embodiment of the universe's feminine powers. With a lofty, illuminated evocation of poets who honor and channel the beauty of nature and lament its loss, Garcia proceeds toward what Pablo Neruda saw "when the purple light whispers to the moon in silent clarity," and searches for the new layers of consciousness and understanding that Octavio Paz called the "bridge between nature and us."

L.A. WEEKLY: When did you first know you were an artist?

CAMILLE ROSE GARCIA: There was never a time when I wasn't drawing, even from a very young age. But I think, maybe I was 3? I remember spinning





What is your short answer to people who ask what your work is about?

My work has always been about nature and escapism and how they intersect

with Capitalism, which I define as, taking all the magic in the world and turning it into landfill.

What would you be doing if you weren't





an artist?

I would be a very broke musician. Or a very broke writer.

Did you go to art school? Why/Why not?

I went to art school in the early 90's when it was still actually affordable. I went to Otis/Parsons for undergrad, then UC Davis for grad school. Unfortunately, it's so expensive now and out of step with the realities of what a career in the arts looks like. The main thing any creative person needs is less monthly overhead.

What do you love about L.A.?

I was born in Los Angeles and have always felt that its particular magical quality, the music, the diversity, the landscapes, have informed who I am on such a deep level. California sort of embodies an entire cultural ideal of expanding forward into the unknown and forming new





territories of consciousness. Whether it be the 60's counterculture movements, the Chicano civil rights movements that were centered here, or the dream machine of Hollywood, Los Angeles has always set the bar a little higher when it comes to an evolving and dynamic creative frontier.

When was your first show?

My first real show was in 1999 at Merry Karnowsky Gallery. I remember the entire show was sold out before it was opened, and yet I was \$60 overdrawn at the bank.

When is/was your current/most recent/next show or project?

My next show opens this Saturday, February 10th in Los Angeles at KP Projects Gallery [K for Merry Karnowsky]. *The*



Polyphonic Fortress is the work I'm most proud of to date! Come and check it out.

What artist living or dead would you most like to show or work with?

I would love to be besties with Remedios Varo and Leonora Carrington and be like, the third wheel friend that brings over great mole so they have to teach me how to talk to cats.

Do you listen to music while you work? If so, what?

Oh man, yes see this is my entire process!! Daytime is usually more instrumental or without lyrics or like, softly whispered. So the classical music station, Ravi Shankar, Druid chanting, Godspeed! You Black Emperor, Sufjan Stevens. If I'm feeling insane, then Gyorgi Ligetti Atmospheres or record-

ings of rainstorms with thunder. If it's winter, Chelsea Wolfe, Fleet Foxes, Bon Iver, Nick Drake, Smog, Nico, Velvet Underground. At night it's louder to keep my energy up, so we do tons of Queens of The Stone Age, Bowie, FUZZ, T.Rex, Tool, Ty Segal, Hole, PJ Harvey, The Distillers, The Pretenders, The Rolling Stones, Black Sabbath, Car Seat Headrest, King Gizzard and the Lizard Wizard, the Clash, The Cramps, The Coathangers, Credence. Also folk—Joni Mitchell, Cat Stevens, Van Morrison, Neil Young. I'm currently listening to The Replacements non-stop. It's like a ritual, I can't start until I hear "The Song."

Prog-metal icons Tool to play hometown shows BY BRETT CALLWOOD



ool might not be the most prolific of rock bands, having released just five full-length studio albums in its 34 years of existence (not everyone can be the Beatles, but that number is still remarkably low). Still, every Tool release is an event. Every Tool show is an event. And that would appear to be by design.

As a result of all this, the band carries an air of mystery. We don't know what it will do next, we certainly don't know what frontman Maynard James Keenan is thinking. But we do know that when Tool performs, it offers an experience. It barely matters that the last album, Fear Inoculum, was released four and a half years ago. Or even that the preceding 10,000 Days came a full 13 years before that. By now, we know that Tool will do things when they're ready, on their own terms, and that works.

On Feb. 14 (Valentine's Day of course) and Feb. 15, Tool will perform at the Crypto.com Arena. That's two

local shows by hometown heroes, and guitarist Adam Jones suggests that the set lists won't necessarily be identical.

"We do have very devoted fans and a lot of them do come for both nights," Jones says. "So we just like to mix it up a bit."

It's only been a few months since Tool performed at the first-ever Power Trip festival in the Coachella Valley. They performed on the same night as thrash titans Metallica, and Jones says that it was one of the best nights of his life.

"Metallica and all those other bands, just playing with them," he says. "It was just very strange because it's not really our crowd. But it was a really good challenge, to kind of step in and do what we do and try to focus on why we do it. It was great."

These two arena shows will be different, but they will still be events. Just not because of, y'know, Valentine's Day. Not really, anyway.

Most likely, there will be another Tool album eventually. All in good time. But again, this band being this band, we have no idea when that will be. Jones does say that the members are always sending stuff to each other, so we at least know that the creative juices continue to flow.

"We did a bit of writing before Christmas," he says. "It's just been hard. We've had some curveballs thrown at us. On the last tour Danny Carey's hip was going. It was so bad, he was limping and the doctor said it was bone on bone, like, there was nothing there. And he was in a lot of pain. He's basically Eddie Van Halen, on drums. I admire how much he rips his guts out

to play, especially with that pain. And so over that Christmas break, he got a hip replacement. We're all biting her nails. He made a 100% recovery, and he's back to being the monster that he is"

Besides Tool, Keenan has A Perfect Circle and Puscifer to work with when he's not on Tool duty. Meanwhile, while Jones might dabble with friends, his focus is on his family.

"I've got three kids," he says. "That's really taken over the urge to be artistic and be productive. That's my new vice, and I love it. I love being Mr. Mom. I love the crying, the vomiting, the whining – I love every bit of it. I honestly do. We just had a new kid. And I still had that fire burning in me to make art. Do music. It didn't work out, but it was a job at Legacy, going back to doing makeup effects. They were working on the new Alien movie, and they're like, 'why don't you come in and sculpt with us?' I almost did it. But it didn't work out. We actually had started writing a little bit. I just live life and search for those things that make me happy - my band, my family and the ocean - I just try to keep it simple."

Children do change things. When it comes to music, we might encourage them to listen to the things we like to listen to, but eventually, they find their own path and listen to their own things. That's how it should be.

"That's the great thing about kids, they're little people and I don't force anything on my kid," Jones says. "Like, I really like wrestling. I'm just letting him see if he discovers it on his own, just like music. At some point, I would play music and he'd be like, 'Daddy, this is too loud.' And now he's 10 years old. Just discovered music and I'm thrilled. He's listening to songs like the *Five Nights at Freddy*'s theme. You know, it's his thing."

That Tool. Family men and side projects and all manner of things that can collectively keep them from Tool. They're all living full lives. But again, when Tool does reconvene, special things happen. And they have plans for 2024.

"We're going to Europe, which I'm excited about," Jones says. "Just some festivals and some of our own dates. We're talking to the record company about, we've always wanted to do a film. But we don't want to do a film that's just, you know, thrown on YouTube. We'd like to do something really substantial. And maybe it has a little more complexity than just a live concert."

Now that will be worth seeing.


